CATALOG DESCRIPTION: This course provides a detailed analysis of the political economy of Pacific Asia through case studies of selected economies since the 1960s. The main aim of the course is to disentangle myths and realities surrounding the economic growth in the Pacific Asian region. Students will explore the High Growth Era in Japan, Asian Newly Industrializing Economies (NIEs), and Asian Transition Economies (ATEs), focusing on the interaction between political and economic institutions in creating economic growth; the external and internal factors that shaped such institutions; the changes after the 1990s; and the implications for other developing countries.		COURSE TOPICS: 1. Overview of the Pacific Asian region (3 hrs) 2. Developmental role of the state (3 hrs) 3. Political economy of Japan's post-war development (6 hrs) 4. The old NIEs and the developmental role of Japan in the region (3 hrs) 5. Political economy of South Korea (3 hrs) 6. ASEAN and the New NIEs (3 hrs) 7. Political economy of Thailand (3 hrs) 8. Political economy of Asian Transition Economies: China (3 hrs) 9. Asian Financial Crisis (3 hrs) 10. Prospects for East Asian economic cooperation (3 hrs)
